Movement Monday 07/20/2020	Motion Magic	Physical Development, Approaches to Learning: Creativity	Recite: Jack Be Nimble Jack be Nimble, Jack Be Quick Jack jump over the candlestick. (Each time, jump forward over an imaginary candle) Infant-secure child in your arms as you chant the rhyme and perform the movements Toddlers and twos repeat the rhyme using different movement as you chant. Slide your feet sideways gallop in place march forward and backward.
Tuneful Tuesday 07/21/2020	Let's Sing	Language and literacy: Language and Communication; Cognitive: Scientific Reasoning	Hold your baby close during bedtime and sing a favorite song again and again. Singing the same song can help your baby feel calm and safe. Your toddler loves to get positive attention from you. Singing is a great way for you and your toddler to share an activity together.
Wacky Wednesday 07/22/2020	Link Words with Actions Cause and Effect	Cognition: Mathematical Development and Scientific Reasoning	When you move your baby from one position or place to another, put words to your actions. Say "up, up, up" when you lift your baby from the changing table, crib, or floor. When you place him down, say "now down you go to play!" These simple words build the foundation for later math and engine . Stand in the bathroom and turn the lights off and on. "When I flip the switch up, the light goes on! What will happen if I flip it down?" They are learning about technology! s
Tell Me a Story Thursday 07/23/2020	Let's Read	Language and Literacy ;	You can inspire a love of books and words in your young child by reading or telling a story together every day
Feelings Friday 07/24/2020	Follow your Child lead	Language and literacy, Language and Communication	Some babies are quiet; some fuss a lot. Some toddlers are quick to tantrum when tired or hungry, while others will take a little longer to get upset. Young children develop at their own pace and have their own patterns of learning and reacting. It helps to learn your child's tendencies, and to ask yourself what they might be feeling in a challenging situation so that you can respond calmly and consistently to their needs.
